up to 90% of Lake Chad has disappeared, putting them at risk on their journeys.



- Extreme heat has been shown to increase stillbirth rates while

climate change, more broadly, is increasing the spread of vector-borne illnesses such as malaria, dengue fever, and Zika virus, all of which are linked to endangering mothers and newborns in particular.
